She will be offering insight into the process of discovering your values to help you find your career, offering practical advice for students to start moving towards their careers after New College,

independent of what career they choose, and providing information about some less well-known careers in health and research. Natalie explored careers in academic research, public health, counseling, therapy, physical therapy, clinical research, medicine, and nursing before she decided on her career. She is currently a research analyst at Vanderbilt University and will be starting her graduate education in August. Her research at Duke University and Vanderbilt University has

spanned a broad range of topics, ranging from educational cognitive neuroscience, the psychology of human-robot interactions, the neural correlates of mindfulness, and the cognitive neuroscience of aging. She was awarded Post-Baccalaureate Fellowship in Functional Neuroimaging at Duke University, published a first-author paper in the journal *Social, Cognitive, and Affective Neuroscience*, coordinated an academic conference at Vanderbilt University on Concepts of Agency in Living and Mechanical Agents, and teaches meditation workshops and classes.
