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Bruce Gilley, Ph.D.

Gilley comes to New College as a distinguished Presidential Scholar in Political Science. One of the nation's foremost scholars on democracy, legitimacy, and global politics, including the comparative politics of Asia and China, he has authored four university-press books, including *The Right to Rule: How States Win and Lose Legitimacy* and *China's Democratic Future*. Additionally, he has authored more than 80 other published works. He was a Commonwealth Scholar from the University of Oxford and a Woodrow Wilson Scholar from Princeton University, in addition to being a member of the editorial boards of the Journal of Democracy and the Journal of Contemporary China. Gilley earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Toronto, M.S. from the University of Oxford, and Ph.D. from Princeton University.



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


Andrew Doyle, Ph.D.

Doyle comes to New College as a Presidential Scholar in Residence. A scholar of English Literature, Doyle has emerged as a cultural icon with large followings in the United Kingdom and United States. He hosts the weekly show Free Speech Nation on GB News and is the writer behind the fictional character Jonathan Pie and the social media sensation Titania McGrath. Doyle's masterful use of satire and parody in his written and broadcast work, and is a renowned standup comedian. He has several books and plays that have gained critical acclaim. He earned an M.A. from the University of York and a D.Phil. from the University of Oxford on full scholarship, both in English Renaissance Literature.



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Stanley Fish, Ph.D.

Fish brings more than 60 years of scholarship with him to New College, where he will serve as a Presidential Scholar in Residence. His incredible career has included teaching stops at Duke, John's Hopkins, and Cal Berkeley, where there is a dedicated library archive of his work. He has held the title of Davidson-Kahn Distinguished University Professor and Professor of Law, Florida International University since 2005, and Dean Emeritus of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at the University of Illinois at Chicago. The Chicago Tribune named Fish was Chicagoan of the Year for Culture in 2003. In the past thirty years, there have been some two hundred articles, books, parts of books, dissertations, review articles, etc., devoted to his work. Fish earned his undergraduate degree at the University of Pennsylvania and his master's and Ph.D. at Yale.



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


Joseph Loconte, Ph.D.

Loconte is among the first group of New College Presidential Scholar's in Residence. A New York Times bestselling author, Loconte brings a wealth of knowledge in the studies of western civilization. Alongside his five books, he produced three short documentaries during his time at the Heritage Foundation. Most recently he served as a distinguished visiting professor at Grove City College. He also has taught at The King's College in New York City and Pepperdine University. Loconte is a scholar of John Locke, and contributed for nearly a decade to NPR's All Things Considered. Loconte earned his Ph.D. at King's College London and holds a master's degree from Wheaton College in Illinois.

Spencer Klavan, Ph.D.

Spencer Klavan comes to New College as a lecturer in the Classics and Languages programs. An accomplished scholar, writer and podcaster, he is the host of the Young Heretics podcast and associate editor of the Claremont Review of Books, where he has written for many outlets, including The Federalist, The Daily Wire, Newsweek, The Atlantic, City Journal, and The American Mind. He is the author of two acclaimed books: Light of the Mind, Light of the World and How to Save the West: Ancient Wisdom for 5 Modern Crises and the editor of Gateway to the Stoics. He has held lecturer and research stints at Oxford University and Yale University. Klavan earned his Ph.D. and master's from Oxford University.



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Richard Izquierdo, Ph.D.

Izquierdo comes to New College as an Associate Professor of Political Science (untenured, credit toward tenure). He augments his immense political science acumen with a background practicing law. He has taught in numerous prestigious programs, starting out as a teaching assistant at Stanford after leaving his legal practice. He was a Thomas W. Smith Postdoctoral Research Assistant at Princeton University, a Constitution Fellow and Visiting Lecturer at the Georgetown University Law Center, and most recently was a Visiting Assistant Professor at SUNY Albany. He has participated in numerous conferences and colloquiums with constitutional law professors and federal judges. Izquierdo earned his J.D. at the University of Pennsylvania Law School and later his Ph.D. in Political Science at Stanford.

Andrew Humphries, Ph.D.

Humphries joins New College as a Visiting Assistant Professor of Economics. He most recently served as a post-doctoral research scholar at the School of Civic and Economic Thought and Leadership at Arizona State. He has a particular focus in Austrian economics. He has instructed graduate-level coursework at George Mason University. Some of his recent course topics include "Great Debates in American Politics & Economics," "Great Ideas in Politics & Ethics," and "Debating Socialism." Humphries earned M.A. and Ph.D. at George Mason University.

Ellis joins New College as an Associate Professor of Political Science (untenured, credit toward tenure). As president of Ellis Analytics, Inc., Ellis has displayed exemplary acumen in public and private sector governance. He was a resident senior fellow and professor at Joint Special Operations University in Tampa for six years. Before that, he held multiple roles with the Defense Intelligence Agency. Ellis earned his M.A. from The Elliott School of International Affairs at George Washington University and his Ph.D. in International Relations and Comparative Politics at the University of Florida.

Hustwit comes to New College as an Assistant Professor of U.S. History. Hustwit left Birmingham-Southern College, where he was a tenured associate professor, to come to Sarasota. In addition to his teaching experience during 10 years in Birmingham, he published two books and established his credentials as a scholar of 20th-Century U.S. History, the American South, the Civil Rights Era, and Latin America. Hustwit earned his M.A. and Ph.D. in American History at the University of Mississippi.

Rohan Loveland, Ph.D.

Loveland comes to New College as an Assistant Professor of Computer Science. Loveland has enjoyed a long career spanning teaching roles in higher education in both the US and abroad, and work in government and industry. While at the Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL), his work centered mostly around classified projects. He later served as CEO of a high-tech, funded biomedical device start-up that has cleared FDA approval. A specialist in machine learning algorithms, he has two patents and is currently in discussions with NASA Ames to extend his current research of finding crashed lunar probes to finding biosignatures and techno signatures. Loveland earned his D.Phil. in Electrical Engineering from Oxford University and an MBA from the University of Texas at Austin.

Marcus Ingram, Ph.D.

Ingram comes to New College as an Associate Professor of Financial Economics (untenured, credit toward tenure). He previously was an Associate Professor and department chair of Finance in the Sykes College of Business at The University of Tampa, where he built the program from the ground up. Ingram has held faculty stints at Georgia State University's Robinson College of Business and Kennesaw State University. His research papers and cases have been published in the Journal of Financial Research, the Journal of Financial Education. Managerial Finance and other national and international journals and proceedings. He is formerly the President and Chief Investment Officer of The Investment Doctors, Inc., a registered investment advisor to high-net-worth individuals and family businesses. Ingram earned his M.S. and Ph.D. from Georgia State University and is a Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) and Chartered Alternative Investment Analyst (CAIA).

Vlad Serban, Ph.D.

Serban comes to New College as an Assistant Professor of Mathematics. He previously held Postdoctoral Research posts at the University of Vienna and Ecole Polytechnique Federale de Lausanne in Switzerland, as well as a Postdoctoral Fellowship at the Fields Institute in Toronto.

Serban is a specialist in algebraic number theory with applications in coding theory and cryptography and is frequently invited for talks at universities including the University of Vienna, University of Luxembourg, Yale University, and the University of Chicago. Serban earned his Ph.D. from Northwestern University and his masters from Ecole Polytechnique Federale de Lausanne (EPFL).

Mans Hulden, Ph.D.

Hulden comes to New College as an Associate Professor in Computer Science and Data Science. He was previously at the University of Colorado at Boulder, and previously conducted postdoctoral research as a Marie Curie fellow at the University of Helsinki and completed a stint as a visiting professor in Computer Science at the University of the Basque Country. His research focuses on developing computational methods to infer and model linguistic structure using varying degrees of prior linguistic knowledge, particularly in the domains of phonology and morphology. Hulden has worked extensively with linguistic applications of finite state technology, modeling of linguistic theory, grammatical inference, and the development of language resources, and is the author of several open-source tools for finite-state language modeling. He teaches courses in computational linguistics, phonology, and phonetics. Hulden received his Ph.D. in Linguistics from the University of Arizona in 2009.

Samantha Levell, Ph.D.

Levell comes to New College as an Assistant Professor of Biology. Levell left Western Oregon University to come back to Florida to continue her teaching and researching. Levell is the recipient of over 10 research and academic development grants and earned her Ph.D. from the University of California, Riverside.

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


Briana Aguila-Ames, Ph.D.

Jeffrey Hanson, Ph.D.

Hanson comes to New College as an Assistant Professor of Philosophy. He left Harvard University as a senior philosopher in The Human Flourishing Program at Harvard's Institute for Quantitative Social Sciences and before that held teaching and research stints at Boston College and Australian Catholic University. He is the editor of *Kierkegaard as Phenomenologist*: An Experiment (Northwestern University Press) and co-editor with Michael R. Kelly of Michel Henry: The Affects of Thought (Bloomsbury). His first monograph, Kierkegaard and the Life of Faith: The Aesthetic, the Ethical, and the Religious in Fear and Trembling, was published by Indiana University Press in 2017. Dr. Hanson's research focuses on issues in philosophy of religion, phenomenology, aesthetics, and ethics. His writings on Kierkegaard, French phenomenology of religion, and the arts are motivated by an ongoing interest in the practical value of philosophy for human flourishing, and he draws on the whole history of philosophy and theology for his teaching, scholarly work, and popular publications on literature, music, film, and popular culture. Hanson earned his Ph.D. from Fordham University.

Daniel Herskowitz, Ph.D.

Herskowitz comes to New College as an Assistant Professor of Judaic Studies. Previously, he was at the University of Oxford as a British Academy Postdoctoral Fellow at the Faculty of Theology and Religion, working on the research project 'Jewish Existentialism and the Legacy of Martin Luther'. Earlier, he was a Career Research Fellow in Jewish Studies at Wolfson College and a postdoctoral fellow at the Religion Department at Columbia University. Dr. Herskowitz is the author of over twenty studies on modern philosophy, modern Jewish thought, Jewish-Christian relations, political theology, secularization, and nationalism. His first book, Heidegger and His Jewish Reception (Cambridge University Press, 2021) was awarded the 2021 Salo W. and Jeannette M. Baron Young Scholars Award for Scholarly Excellence. His essay "Between Exclusion and Intersection: Heidegger's Philosophy and Jewish Volkism" was the winner of the Leo Baeck Year Book Essay Prize for 2020. Herskowitz earned his Ph.D. from the University of Oxford.

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


Hesam Sharifian, Ph.D.

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


Tom Bailey, Ph.D.
